Stradivarius 1680 Violin "Paganini"

The violinist and chamber musician Pinchas Adt, winner of numerous prizes, is one of the most exciting young musicians in Germany. As a founding member and the second violinist of the Goldmund Quartet, he plays in the most renowned concert halls worldwide, such as the Suntory Hall in Tokyo, the Elbphilharmonie in Hamburg, the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam and the Musikverein in Vienna, and is a welcome guest at the most important music festivals. He has also performed with Arabella Steinbacher, Jörg Widmann, Boris Berezovsky, Xenia Sidorova and many

others. CD productions have been released by NAXOS and Berlin Classics. After studies at the renowned universities of Munich, Stuttgart, Berlin, Madrid and Karlsruhe, Pinchas completed a soloist's examination with Prof. Breuninger Karlsruhe with top marks. He was a scholarship holder of the German Music Competition, is a recipient of the Bavarian Art Promotion Award, a special prize winner of the ARD Competition, as well as the 2nd prize winner of the International Chamber Music Competition in London and the 1st prize winner of the Melbourne International Wigmore Hall Competition. The ensemble's most recent award is the Music Prize of the Jürgen Ponto Foundation. He devotes himself with special interest to teaching and gives numerous international workshops and courses.

He plays the Stradivarius 1680 Violin "Paganini" on loan from the Nippon Music Foundation.

Stradivarius 1727 Violin "Paganini"

Florian Schötz was born in Munich, Germany. He studied in Berlin, Nuremberg, Vienna and Madrid with Prof. Daniel Gaede, Prof. Günter Pichler and Prof. Gerhard Schulz, among others. As primarius of the Goldmund Quartet, he has received numerous awards at national and international competitions. Among them are prizes at the ARD International Music Competition and the Wigmore Hall International String Quartet Competition. In 2018, the quartet received the 1st prize and a special prize at the

Melbourne International Chamber Music Competition. He performs with his string quartet at international festivals and has given concerts in all European countries, Morocco, Canada, Colombia, USA, Japan, South Korea and China. Florian teaches at the Hochschule für Musik und Theater "Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy" in Leipzig and at the University of Music and Performing Arts Vienna. In the summer semester of 2023, he will teach at the Hochschule für Musik Karlsruhe as a substitute professor.

He plays the Stradivarius 1727 Violin "Paganini" on loan from the Nippon Music Foundation.

Born in Hyogo, Japan, Rino Yoshimoto began the violin at the age of 3. She is currently a student of Prof.Michael Frischenschlager at the University of Music and Performing Arts Vienna and Prof. Augustin Dumay at the Queen Elisabeth Music Chapel in Belgium. She is a prize winner of numerous international violin competitions including the 16th Padova International Music Competition "Premio Citta di Padova" in 2018, winning the first prize in the strings division as well as the grand prize in all divisions, which brought her to Russia and Italy to give concerts. She was a finalist at the 3rd Shanghai Isaac Stern International Violin Competition in 2020, and the 2nd prize at the 10th Fritz Kreisler International Violin Competition in 2022. She has performed with orchestras in Japan, Austria, Bulgaria, Greece, the USA, and Italy. In 2019 she gave her first performances at the Carnegie Hall and the Konzerthaus in Vienna. In 2022 she made a successful tour to Spain with the Vienna Chamber Orchestra as a soloist as well as performed with the Vienna Radio Symphony Orchestra, the Bulgarian National Radio Symphony Orchestra, and the Frascati Symphonic of Belgium. Since 2022, she has been a substitute member of the Vienna Staatsoper Orchestra. She was a recipient of the 2020/2021 Rohm Music Foundation Scholarship (Japan) and is currently receiving a scholarship from Mr. Heinz Schinner in Vienna.

She plays the Stradivarius 1736 Violin "Muntz" on loan from the Nippon Music Foundation.

Stradivarius 1736 Cello Paganini"

Raphael Paratore is a renowned cellist born in Munich, Germany in 1992, to a family of musicians. He has won multiple awards at national and international cello competitions and received scholarships from various organizations including the Yehudi Menuhin "Live Music Now", the Deutsche Stiftung Musikleben, TONALI, Studienstiftung des Deutschen Volkes and PE-Förderung. As a member of the Goldmund Quartet, he has won numerous awards including the first prize at the Melbourne International Chamber Music Competition and is a laureate of the 2016 ARD International Music Competition and the Bavarian Arts Promotion Prize. In addition to his quartet activities, Raphael regularly performs at international chamber music festivals and has collaborated with renowned musicians such as Nino Gvedatze, Baiba Skride, and Jörg Widmann.


Raphael has studied under prominent cellists including Claudio Bohorquez, Reinhard Latzko, and Wolfgang-Emanuel Schmidt. He has also received guidance from renowned professors and musicians like Prof. Wolfgang Boettcher, Prof. David Geringas, and Alfred Brendel. In 2022/23, the Goldmund Quartet will continue to perform at prestigious concert halls such as Berlin Konzerthaus, Elbphilharmonie, Gewandhaus Leipzig, Musikverein Graz, Tokyo Suntory Hall, and others.

Stradivarius 1680 Violin "Paganini"

This violin was one of the Antonio Stradivari (1644-1737) instruments possessed by the celebrated violin virtuoso Niccolò Paganini (1782-1840) and together with a violin of 1727, a viola of 1731, and a cello of 1736, formed the quartet. After Paganini, the instruments were separated until Emil Herrmann, a renowned dealer in New York, brought them back together in 1940s and sold them to Mrs. Anna E. Clark. She then donated this quartet to the Corcoran Gallery of Arts in Washington D.C., from which the Nippon Music Foundation acquired the set in 1994.



Stradivarius 1727 Violin "Paganini"

The history of this violin dates back to Count Cozio di Salabue. In 1817, Niccolò Paganini (1782-1840) obtained this violin, and from his son Baron Achille, Parisian dealer Jean-Baptiste Vuillaume acquired it. In around 1893, the violin was bought by Ernest Nicolini, a tenor and amateur violinist, who was the husband of famous soprano Adelina Patti (1843-1919). In 1914 W. E. Hill & Sons sold the violin to renowned collector Mr. Felix Kahn of New York. After passing ownership by W. R. Ford & Co. in 1927, the violin was purchased by Emil Herrmann.

The label attached to this instrument bears an Italian inscription, "d'anni 92 (92 years old)", handwritten by Stradivari himself. It has a first class reputation for its excellent condition and tonal quality. This violin takes its name from a famous collector and amateur violinist, H. M. Muntz of Birmingham, England, who owned it since 1872. This is one of the last instruments made by Stradivari, who passed away in 1737.

In 1840, this cello was sold from Parisian dealer Jean-Baptiste Vuillaume to a German amateur named Mr. Lemire. In about 1876, an art dealer in Frankfurt named Kaiser acquired it and passed it on to the collector Mr. C. G. Meier of London. In 1877, he sold it to Mr. Ernest Ladenburg, councillor of Frankfurt, who in turn sold it to Mr. Robert von Mendelssohn in 1895, after which it remained in the possession of the Mendelssohn family until renowned dealer Emil Herrmann obtained this cello.

The Foundation now owns 21 string instruments (15 Stradivarius violins, 1 viola, 3 cellos and 2 Guarneri del Gesù violins), and as the custodian of these world cultural assets, maintains them for future generations and loans them gratis to young promising musicians and internationally active musicians regardless of their nationalities.
